Blessed Virgin Mary Our Lady of Guadalupe, Tecoatlaxope, bringing Christ to all of the peoples of Mexico, and as our Patroness, to all of the Americas, appearing to St. Juan Diego Cuauhtlatotzin at Tepeyac in Mexico in 1531



Bishop John England bringing Christ to all of the peoples of South Carolina, Native Americans, African Americans, and Irish and other European Americans, appointed the first Bishop of Charleston in 1820



St. Peter Claver bringing Christ to the Africans enslaved and brought in captivity to the Americas, to Colombia, and baptized in their hundreds of thousands by St. Peter, called "the slave of the slaves forever," who died in 1654



Jesuit Martyrs and Saints Pères Isaac Jogues, Jean de Brébeuf, Antony Daniel, Gabriel Lalement, Charles Garnier, Noel Chabanel, and Oblates René Goupil and Jean de la Lande bringing Christ to French America in 1649



Franciscan Martyrs of Georgia Frays Pedro de Corpa, Miguel de Añon, Blas de Rodríguez, Francisco de Veráscola, and Brother Antonio de Bádajoz bringing Christ to the Gual Indians of the Georgia and South Carolina Atlantic Coast in 1597



Christopher Columbus and the Franciscans and other Missionary priests and religious brothers and sisters, bringing Christ to all of South and Central and North America for the first time at San Salvador in the Bahamas in 1492
